- --what are the political values of the film
- --the nature of the "outsider" in this world.
- --what did you think of the ending....both the ending-in-general- and the last shot of the film.
- --what happens to our characters in three years? In fifteen years?

For the sake of our discussion, here's a list of the main characters- so that I can refer to them by name in the lecture.

Bachir Lazhar- teacher
Alice- the girl
Simon- the boy
Claire- another teacher
Mrs. Vaillancourt- the principal
Gaston- the gym teacher
Victor- not the brightest kid in the class
